Council President Bertollo invited all present to join him in the Pledge of Allegiance

STATEMENT

Adequate notice of this meeting has been provided by the Annual Schedule of Regular Meetings heretofore adopted and posted on the Public Bulletin Board at the Municipal Building, emailed to the Hawthorne Press, Herald News, The Record, The Gazette and all persons who have requested the mailing of such schedule, and a copy of said schedule has remained on file in the office of the Borough Clerk from and since December 8, 2016.

CLOSED SESSION:

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 10:4-13 and the Attorney General's Formal Opinion 29-1976, I entertain a motion to adopt resolution **CS 01-17**, that the public be excluded from this portion of the meeting in order that the Council may discuss **Contract Negotiations**. Items to be discussed in the closed session can be disclosed to the public when a course of action is determined or a decision has been reached. Council President Bertollo entertained a motion to enter into closed session, moved by Councilman Bennett, seconded by Councilman Mele. Carried on voice vote.

ADJOURN CLOSED SESSION, RETURN TO REGUALR MEETING:

Council President Bertollo entertained a motion to close the closed session and return to the regular meeting, moved by Councilman Lane, seconded by Councilman Sinning. On roll call all voted yes; motion carried.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Approval of Minutes for the Regular Meeting of January 4, 2017; moved by Council Vice President Matthews, seconded by Councilman Mele. Carried on voice vote.

PUBLIC COMMENT (Agenda Items Only)

Council President Bertollo opened the meeting to the public. He stated if anyone desired to be heard, please raise your hand to be recognized, come forward to the microphone state your name and address and sign the sheet for the record. He stipulated this be for agenda items only. Seeing none, Council President Bertollo entertained a motion to close public comment, moved by Councilman Bennett, seconded by Councilman Sinning. Carried on voice vote.

ADOPTION OF ORDINANCES: None.

OLD BUSINESS:

Council Vice President Matthews asked Attorney Pasquale for an update on the designation of 55 Westervelt Ave for affordable housing obligation. He responded it is a lengthy process and does not have a time frame but will advise once this may be known. Council President Bertollo asked what the owner is doing now to adhere to the process. Attorney Pasquale explained the process as: an attorney has to be obtained; next, a deed restriction has to be created to create affordability controls which will have to be reviewed by our special master, the planning board and himself. Once created, they will have to work with the existing tenants. Council President Bertollo asked for that part to be completed as soon as possible. Attorney Pasquale stated the property has been purchased and is now for the purposes of our affordable housing. This will not impact us or delay us in getting our affordable housing plans approved. Council President Bertollo confirmed we are in compliance. Attorney Pasquale agreed and Administrator Maurer added as long as progress is being made. Council Vice President Matthews is frustrated that this process is taking so long from start to finish with no end in sight.

Councilman Wojtecki asked for an update on the boat still being stored on the wholesale car lot on Wagaraw Road. Attorney Pasquale responded there is no current Certificate of Occupancy for the property so nothing should be stored there. Administration will follow up.

Councilman Wojtecki asked about cars at 85 Wagaraw Rd., Congress Textile. Administrator Maurer responded he thought they had approval from the Planning Board to park cars there. Councilman Wojtecki's concern is that the cars are parked over the water source and right next to the building. Attorney Pasquale stated the concern is if they are adhering to what was approved by the Planning Board and asked for a copy of the resolution to review. Council President Bertollo stated the Zoning Administrator was supposed to review the resolution and their compliance. He asked that Administration follow up.

Councilman Wojtecki asked for an update on the double handicap ramps at McKinley and Parmalee Ave's. He added there are double ramps on one side and single ramps on the other. As per Boswell Engineer Mike Kelly, all four corners should have double ramps and he will look into the matter and advise.

NEW BUSINESS:

Councilman Wojtecki stated he is concerned the Borough is cutting down more trees than they are planting in order to remain a nice green community. Council Vice President Matthews added due to the winter, there will be some gaps with the planting. Dria Lobosco of the Shade Tree Committee added they have approval for 75 trees to be planted in the Spring. Council President Bertollo invited Ms. Lobosco to report on this after she is sworn in as the Chairwoman.

Council Vice President Matthews stated he had the pleasure of attending an Eagle Scout Court of Honor event this past weekend for two scouts from Hawthorne Troop 85. They wished to convey their appreciation for the certificate and acknowledgement from the mayor and council.

Councilman Lane congratulated Madison Noordeloos from Hawthorne High School who recently scored her 1000th point in her basketball career.

Council President Bertollo stated there will be a program at 6:30pm February 1, 2017, "Defend your Teen" at Hawthorne High School, sponsored by the Hawthorne Police Department, Municipal Alliance and The Board of Education. The Council meeting also being held on February 1st will start at 8:00pm instead of 7:00pm so that the Council may attend the program. Mayor Goldberg will also mention the program during his Administrative Agenda.

ADMINISTRATIVE AGENDA PRESENTED BY MAYOR GOLDBERG:

An important parent informational program, "Defend your Teen" will be at Hawthorne High School on February 1st from 6:30-8:30pm in the high school auditorium. A truly riveting presentation will unveil dozens of deadly new drugs and drug use techniques that are currently plaguing our teen social scene. Discover how to raise a drug free teen. If you have a teen you cannot afford to miss this life saving presentation.

Just a reminder all dogs must be licensed by the end of January – please license your dog by January 31st to avoid a late fee. The Borough calendars were mailed at the end of December; if you didn't receive one, you can call the DPW administration office for a copy, or go to the website where you will find a scanned copy on the home page. For those of you who liked the one page "Recycling Schedule", we have those available in Borough Hall and also on the Borough website. Just a reminder - if you live in the area in town that requires a resident parking permit, or you are a commuter who uses the NJ Transit train, please purchase your parking permit sticker to avoid a ticket. Christmas trees continue to be picked up curbside until the end of January.

MAYOR'S APPOINTMENTS:

Dria Lobosco, Chairwoman of the Hawthorne Shade Tree Commission; Mayor Goldberg administered the Oath of Office.

Ms. Lobosco stated she will be reestablishing communication with the Borough with the help of their new Administrative Assistant Colleen Hansen. Councilman Wojtecki introduced himself as the Shade Tree Liaison and Ms. Lobosco replied she will keep him advised of the happenings of the Commission.

Mayors Appointment with Advice and Consent:

Council President Bertollo entertained a motion to appoint Eleanor ConlyWenzke as Alternate No. 2 Member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment for a term of four years, moved by Councilman Lane, seconded by Councilman Sinning. On roll call, all voted yes; motion carried. Mayor Goldberg administered the Oath of Office.

REPORTS:

Attorney Michael Pasquale

Affordable Housing – The Supreme Court rendered a decision earlier in the day, finding that the obligation to provide affordable housing for low income households formed during what is known as the “Gap Years” had to be addressed. He indicated that while he had not yet had a chance to read the opinion, there is not likely any impact on Hawthorne. Our obligation to create affordable housing remains limited by our lack of developable lands, a point that even Dr. Kinsey concedes. Equally important, Hawthorne had the foresight, by working with developers like Mr. Gorga, to create affordable housing even when there were no rules in place and no obligation to do so.

Attorney Pasquale appeared before Judge Brogan last week for a Case Management Conference. The Court was encouraged by reports from counsel, including counsel for 204 Wagaraw and Kohler, as well as the Special Master, that progress has been made in settlement talks. As such, the Court granted a 60 day extension of the immunity previously granted. When settlement talks reach the point where a recommendation can be made to this council, it will be presented.

Vacant and Abandoned Properties – Mr. Pasquale noted that 2017 registrations are coming in, along with payments. He did not have a chance to check with Vanessa and get an update but noted that the higher payment due in 2017 would hopefully compel owners to bring properties back into use.

Engineers Report Mike Kelly

DPW Building - The Borough asked us to reduce the building size from six (6) bays to five (5). Plans are being revised.

2016 Road Program - Smith Sondy will address the corrective work associated with the handicap ramps and striping on McKinley Avenue in the Spring.

Well Contamination - Samples of both the influent and effluent will be collected and analyzed by two (2) independent labs. Costs from two (2) NJ labs were received and forwarded to the Administrator for authorization to proceed. The sampling was just authorized and our office will schedule the work with the laboratories.

Streetscape Project - A pre-construction meeting is scheduled for February 2nd.

Water System Generators - Keith Post of Post and Kelly indicated the only thing left is the startup of the generator, which is provided by the supplier, Cooper Electric. Estimate #3 with Change Order #2 has been submitted to the Borough for payment.

Prescott Avenue Rehabilitation - The Borough will ask Capital Alternatives to submit an application.

Wagaraw Road Pump Station - Another set of plans was forwarded to Michael Post of MJP Welding, the DPW's recommended contractor. Michael has asked his detailer for pricing for the necessary shop drawings.

Passaic Avenue Sewer Lining - A study is going to be required to fix the capped storm pipe, and does not have anything to do with the sewer pipe lining, which was completed. Our office will provide an estimate to correct the problem.

Rock Road Improvements - A pre-construction meeting is being scheduled for either the end of this week or the beginning of next week.

Water Storage Tank Painting - A proposal to address the rehabilitation and cathodic protection for both the Mary Street and Goffle Hill Water Tanks was submitted to the Borough. We are waiting for authorization to proceed.

Goffle Brook Park Soccer Field - The County has still not submitted to SHPO.

GPS Field Survey and GIS Services - Data collection for six (6) of the nine sections of the Borough are addressed, and a seventh section is scheduled for next week, weather permitting.

Municipal Complex Message Board - The specification was provided to the Administrator to review. We recommend a new dedicated electric service be installed for the message board and have asked Post & Kelly for an estimate to construct.

2017 Road Program - Construction cost estimates for the resurfacing of the potential list of roads for 2017 were prepared and submitted to the Administrator for review.

Tax Map Updates - Our Survey Dept. is updating the Borough's Tax Maps. A request for final maps or deeds for a list of properties or subdivisions was submitted to the Administrator.

Administrator Maurer

The first financial close out using the new financial software Edmunds is going very slowly. He stated this is caused by finding new problems from the conversion. This could impact when the budgetary review process for 2017 begins. He will advise the Council and Finance Committee on this. Our accessed evaluation for 2017 is now set at \$1,220,451,618.00. This number is up by .07 percent. Although this doesn't sound like much after the post-recession appeals and minimal new construction, this is the first increase of any amount in 8 years. The developer for the Hawthorne Square Apartments, at the independent sheet metal property, seems eager to get started. Administrator Maurer stated they contact him today to set up an engineering escrow account, provision of temporary water during construction and for our soil movement requirements. There are several important preconditions before any issuance of building permits including the payments for water and sewer connections and the Affordable Housing Rehab Fund. The Borough of Woodcliff Lake is interested in brine and we will be providing them with one tank full to run a test. Our own second tank per application for a smaller truck should be in next week to allow us to better serve some of our narrower streets. The Borough is advertising the position of pool manager for the 2017 summer season and applications are available at Borough Hall. The Preconstruction meeting for the Street Scape Construction of the Downtown Revitalization Program will be on February 2nd.

Questions for the Administration

Councilman Lane asked Engineer Kelly when the revised building plans will be available for the new DPW building. He responded 3- 4 weeks. Councilman Lane stated it needed to be sooner to which Engineer Kelly responded he would speak with the designer tomorrow. Councilman Lane responded the committee would like to meet again but would like to have sufficient drawings.

Councilman Mele asked Engineer Kelly what he meant by "a cap was found." He explained there was a drain coming off the sanitary line and it is blocked or capped. This needs to be redirected.

Council President Bertollo asked if there were any other questions for the Administration. Seeing none, Council President Bertollo entertained a motion to record the Administrative Agenda, moved by Councilman Bennett, seconded by Councilman Wojtecki. Carried on voice vote.
